Hi all! Welcome to another riveting installment of the Junior Bulletin Treasurers Report, where I will continue to try to convince you that being your clubs Treasurer can be FUN! Hmmm...still not buying it???

This month's article will give you some general framework for new Treasurers or clubs with mostly new membership or clubs that just need a refresher. This is back to basics –

Treasurer 101. In chatting with folks at the Fall Conference I thought this might be helpful to new regimes.

First – In prior articles, we have already gone over some of the more immediate needs surrounding taxes, nonprofit status, insurance, and how to handle contributions.

Now, what do you do day to day, or month to month?? This information is in the Blue Book in much more detail, and I truly encourage you to read the Treasurer section. While I have not yet penned my updates, the vast majority of the information provided is accurate and would be helpful if you are new. You should also have a copy of your clubs Bi-Laws. This document governs all club activity and there should be a section on rules around the finances.

Does your club have a budget? If not, it should. This is just a simple document that makes an estimate of what monies will come in (from Dues, Fundraisers, Donations, whatever your club has) and an estimate of what monies will go out (in dues and insurance to CJW, Membership Costs, Project Costs, Cost for supplies for fundraisers, again, whatever you club has).

Does your club get a regular financial report? If not, it should. I have seen this done different ways. There is no one right way, but each month your club should be apprised of the financial standing of the club. At CJW, bank account balances are shared, and some clubs might opt to do that. At some clubs and other similar organizations, a list of all the transactions is shared, and other clubs might opt to do that. Some organizations additionally do project financial reports – particularly on large fundraisers, so the sources and uses of funds can be shared with the membership. The definition of “regular reporting” generally means monthly, though many clubs don’t meet in the summer so it is OK if there is some hiatus. If your club is not sharing financial information and would like further assistance on how to accomplish this, please contact me directly and I would be happy to help you achieve that goal.

Is your bank account reconciled each month? If not, it should be. This is a standard method of ensuring that no unintentional errors have occurred either by the keeper of the books, or by the bank. The bank reconciliation may also be used as the clubs financial report – just a thought!

Does your bank account have two signers? If not, it should! First, it is never a good idea for any one individual to have total control of the finances. One person can be responsible, but there should always be a backup person. One recommendation might be to appoint a long time member as the backup. That person may never have to do anything at all, but something happens to your current treasurer the club funds are not inaccessible. In the worst case scenario, if there should ever be the suspicion of misuse of funds, the Club needs to have the authority to act in the Clubs best interest and make changes as they see fit. A back up is good, but you should also have a process to remove former Treasurers from the signature cards on file with the bank when they are no longer the Treasurer. Again, just good practice! This may also be stated in your Bylaws as a requirement of the organization. Some clubs may also require two signatures on checks over a certain amount.

I will leave you this month with two additional items:

- 1) Dues – most clubs have now paid their dues for the membership that existed as of the date of the Presidents Report (2/28/14). Just a reminder that you should continue to submit \$6 for each new member who joins throughout the year. The general rule would be that from each payment of dues the club receives, \$6 should be forwarded on to CJW.
- 2) Need help?? If your Club has any questions, please do not hesitate to contact me. If you would like me to attend a club meeting, that can be arranged. I can consult with you by e-mail or telephone, or if you have a topic you would like me to address in the Bulletin, please let me know.

I am very pleased to begin my journey as Long Term Affiliate liaison to FS:FH. I am looking forward to working with the staff at ABRI/PFC Nicolas A. Madaras Home and helping CJW coordinate our support for our state project. I know I have some very large shoes to fill, but I also know with the help of our wonderful members in so many CJW clubs, we will continue our successful partnership with FS:FH.

I have already reached out to Claudia Nielson, Development Director for ABRI, Homes for the Brave. She was so kind to give me an update about what they have been up to recently.

Recently, Channel 3 The Eyewitness News I-Team has launched a series called "Keeping the Promise," focused on exposing issues facing veterans in Connecticut and provide a platform to those offering help. They did three stories on homeless veterans that ABRI is helping. The first story is about Cynthia, who is a resident at the PFC Nicholas A. Madaras Home. It's really a remarkable feeling knowing that our support is directly helping Cynthia and other residents at the home to get back on their feet and to live happy, healthy, productive lives.

One point that was particularly striking to me, both in the articles and my conversation with Claudia, is that there are **open beds** in both the male and female programs. We know that there is such a tremendous need for assistance for our homeless veterans, and these services are ready and waiting. It truly is a matter of getting the word out that these homes and services are available.

Women especially, often do not seek out services, out of fear, shame or other reasons. They may temporarily sleep on a relative's couch or other emergency situation, but those arrangements do not offer the services that FS:FH provides.

These services include case management, life skills, a safe and stable place to live, job assistance, and ultimately, transition into permanent housing.

We can help by getting the word out to our friends, family, co-workers, community groups, asking them to share the information. The more the information is shared, the higher the likelihood that a homeless veteran can be helped. In this age of electronic/social media, it seems that one of the best ways to do that is by sharing on-line. Please "like" and share their Facebook pages and the other links listed above.

Muddy Buddies – By Chex

9 cups Chex cereal

1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips

½ cup peanut butter
¼ cup butter or margarine
1 tsp vanilla
1 ½ cups powder sugar

Steps:

1. Put cereal in a large mixing bowl.
2. In a microwave safe bowl, microwave chocolate, peanut butter, and butter on HIGH for 1 minute. Stir. Microwave for about 30 seconds more, until the mixture is smooth to mix onto the cereal. Stir in vanilla.
3. Pour the chocolate mixture over cereal and stir until all cereal is coated evenly.
4. Put cereal into a zip lock bag.
5. Add powdered sugar, and shake until all the cereal is coated.
6. Spread out on wax paper until cool.

Store in an airtight container!

Highlights and News from our Clubs:

Junior Women's Club of Fairfield : Our elves have been very busy preparing for our 29th Annual

"A Visit to Santa's House" scheduled for December 13 & 14 at the Burr Homestead in Fairfield. A cherished town tradition attended by generations of families, A Visit to Santa's House consistently raises thousands of dollars for charity. Proceeds from this year's event will benefit the club's charitable partner, the "JWC Girls Zone" at the Cardinal Shehan Center in Bridgeport. See attached flier for more info.

The Monroe Women's Club:

We are working on several winter projects. The first is our Poinsettia Fundraiser. We offer them in white, pink and red. Plants will be delivered to residents' home or businesses in Monroe on Friday, Dec. 5th. The second project is our Luminary Fundraiser. These are ordered through our P.O. Box at \$5 per dozen. Order deadline is Dec. 7th with delivery to homes in Monroe on Dec. 13th. The club also participates in the town's giving tree and donates \$300 in gift cards to the Monroe Social Service Dept. We call this our Adopt a Neighbor Project.

Our biggest winter project is our Holiday Tree Lighting at the Monroe Town Green Gazebo on Saturday, Dec. 6th. The event starts at 5:30 pm and the public is invited to enjoy free cookies, hot cocoa & coffee. Music & singing is provided by the High School and Middle School students. Later, Santa & Mrs. Claus make an appearance by Fire Truck and greet all the children. Finally, our club has started to support Wreaths Across America which places wreaths on the graves of veterans in CT. Last year the club purchased 2 wreaths. I imagine we will do the same this year.

Orange Community Women:

Our first beautification project got underway with an assessment of the garden area and condition of the signage at Wright's Pond. A decision was made to hold off the majority of the work until the Spring, though some fall plantings were added.

We also held our annual Halloween party with the Tracy Bunch. All of our guests arrived in costume, and immediately posed for a group photo. The craft that was chosen for this event was decorating a 5 x 7 wooden frame, immediately followed by cupcake decorating. While the festivities were taking place, the photos were printed and inserted into the frames. We wrapped up the evening with several games of bingo (until everyone had won a prize). As everyone left, they took home their prizes, candy and framed photo. A great time was had by all!

On Monday, November 17th we will be serving dinner to the women residents at Homes for the Brave. Everyone puts together a dish, and then several of our group members bring the meal and spend some time visiting. It's always a lovely evening.

To further support our LTA, we will be holding a fundraiser on Wednesday, December 3rd at Bertucci's in Orange. If you would like to attend, download the voucher attached to the

newsletter. Simply show the voucher to your server prior to ordering. We will receive 15% of the total check. This also pertains to takeout orders. Come join us for this worthwhile cause!

Orange Community Juniores:

We have formed a team – “The Jazzy Juniores” and will be participating in our tri-town Relay for Life event to be held in May of 2015. Our first group fundraiser was held on October 26th, selling hot chocolate, coffee and popcorn at “Trunk or Treat.” It was a cold, windy afternoon so our booth was very popular, and it gave us a good start toward our fundraising goal!

On October 29th we spent time with our friends at Silverbook Senior Center. Rather than do a craft, we opted to play board games and share a snack with them. We had a huge turnout and everyone had a great time. We’ll be going back to Silverbook in December along with Orange Community Women for a joint holiday party.

Our next event is our “Wonderland Waggin’ Tails Pet Food Drive”, to collect food and supplies for the Milford Animal Shelter. The Shelter services both the towns of Milford and Orange and is open to all residents who are having difficulty feeding their pets due to hard economic times. We will have collection boxes at Petco and Pet Supplies Plus later in November, and then have a collection area at our town’s tree lighting ceremony on December 7th.

Trumbull Community Women:

We again sponsored the 2 mile Health Walk at the 24th Great Pumpkin Classic held on Oct. 19th at the Trumbull High School campus. Despite the cold weather, runners and walkers from all over the area turned up to support this annual event. All proceeds raised went to fund high school scholarships.

On Sunday, Oct. 26, the Trumbull Library on Quality Street was the setting as the community celebrated the memory of Clarence Heimann, Trumbull’s longest serving first selectman, who died in October at his home in New Hampshire, at the age of 99. We provided the refreshments for the afternoon ceremony that was hosted by Mary Keane and included speakers Suzanne Burr Monaco, Joan Plouffe and Heimann’s daughter Carol. Cindy Nigro, co-president of TCW, said there was a sentimental reason for their involvement. Heimann served from 1961 to 1973, at the time that their club was getting started, and was a motivating force behind the building of many schools, parks, and the very Community Room where their club meets every month. “He did so much to make Trumbull the town that we all love,” Nigro said, “that he’s an inspiration to us every day.”

The veterans are greeted with breakfast and treats before the ceremony to honor them. They then go into the classrooms and speak with the students about their experiences serving our country. On the way out the veterans receive gift bags enclosing a roll of Life Savers and a \$1 scratch lotto ticket. The day is so heartwarming, meaningful and a very successful event for our Veterans. **Only the Best for Them!**

Stratford Junior Women's Club:

The Stratford Junior Woman's Club hosted a fundraiser at Two Roads Brewery in Stratford on November 20th to benefit the Sterling House Toy Drive and Adopt-a-Family Program, their annual high school scholarships and other community projects which anticipates raising over \$2000. In addition, the Mayor of Stratford matched our goal by making a donation from his annual charity golf tournament of another \$2000. THIS AND THAT

Here's a recipe that is just too yummy to pass up.

Blueberry Yum-Yum

- 1 10 oz package Lorna Doone cookies (or another type of shortbread cookie)
- ¼ cup butter, melted
- 8 oz cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup confectioners' sugar
- 2 8-oz containers frozen whipped topping, thawed
- 12 oz can blueberry pie filling
- 1 cup chopped pecans

Directions:

- Preheat oven to 350F. Crush the cookies and reserve about ½ cup of the crumbs for the topping. Mix the cookie crumbs with the melted butter. Press them into the bottom of a 9 x 13" glass baking dish. Bake for 5 minutes and then cool completely.
- In a large bowl, combine the softened cream cheese, confectioners' sugar and 1 container of the whipped topping by hand. Spread mixture over cooled crust.
- Drop dollops of the blueberry pie filling over the cream cheese layer and spread carefully. Sprinkle pecans over the pie filling. Top with remaining container of whipped topping and sprinkle with the reserved crushed cookies. Chill at least 2 hours before serving.
